The year 2008-2009 has been a particularly important year for the Centre for Reformation and Renaissance Studies (CRRS). The number and quality of activities has remained high, the undergraduate program in Renaissance Studies continues to prosper, and the library is growing at a steady pace. It was during the past academic year, moreover, that the Centre was formally reviewed and received a very positive assessment.

The events for the year numbered fifty-eight and were well attended, with the total number of participants exceeding 1300. Two well-known scholars were invited for its premier annual events: in the fall session Stuart Clark of the University of Swansea delivered the Erasmus Lecture on the topic “The Temptation of Saint Anthony and the Art of Discernment”; and in the spring term Andrew Pettegree of St. Andrew’s was the Distinguished Visiting Scholar, lecturing on “The Book World of Renaissance Europe” and on “Calvin and international Calvinism: Reflections in an Anniversary Year”. During the course of the academic year there were also several one-day seminars and co-sponsored lectures and also many Friday workshops. A SSHRC-funded international conference on “The Devil in Society in the Pre-Modern World” was organized by the CRRS in October. Furthermore, the CRRS hosted a special event when “Making Publics”, the SSHRC-sponsored project directed from McGill University, held its seminars and theatrical performances for 2008 on the Victoria campus as part of the Renaissance Spring Festival which, co-ordinated as in past years by Dr. Manuela Scarci, proved very successful.

The publication sector of the CRRS too has remained very active, with the production of six books in addition to the regular issues of several journals. Collaboration with the ITER project has continued to make it possible for the Centre to support a number of graduate students, in addition to those hired directly. The undergraduate Renaissance Studies Program maintains healthy enrolments and work is underway this summer to provide more publicity for it.

For many of its activities the CRRS has again received support from various institutional units on campus and also from the Istituto Italiano di Cultura. As in the past donations were made this year by many individual supporters in order to support the programs, special fellowships, and other funds. A large number of donations of both rare and modern books to the CRRS library this past year complemented the regular acquisitions, adding significantly to the collection.

For all the events, library development, and book production the organization is, of course, the responsibility of the Assistant to the Director. Dr. Stephanie Treloar, who was hired in this

position one year ago, has displayed a strong commitment to the CRRS. With her remarkable talents she has proven to be a great asset to the Centre.

During the past academic year the CRRS underwent a review at the end of which it received very positive evaluations. The two distinguished scholars from the US who acted as external reviewers have expressed approval of the current activities of the Centre and have also encouraged further development of its academic role at the graduate level.

As the fourth year of my mandate as Director comes to an end, I wish to express my sincere thanks to all those who, in addition to the Assistant to the Director, have offered their assistance, and first of all, to the approximately sixty different persons who served this past year alone as members of the six CRRS committees, and who, hailing from twenty-five different academic units and representing many disciplines, have provided invaluable input in the decision-making. The indispensable support received from the Chief Librarian and his staff, the Principal and his Associate Director, and the President of Victoria and his office has also been much appreciated.

I am pleased to be leaving the CRRS in the most capable hands of the incoming Interim Director, Professor Jane Couchman, and in a year's time in those of the next Director, Professor Lynne Magnusson, and I offer my very best wishes to both for the continued success of the CRRS.
